Overview

This Plan Review, driven by members of the Keighley Big Local Partnership covers the period of the Big Local Funding Agreement from April 2016 to March 2018 and is informed by the Keighley Big Local Plan endorsed January 2016 by Local Trust.

The Review Report provides an overview of the first Keighley Big Local Plan. This has been a period of learning for the Keighley Big Local Partnership and Airedale Enterprise Services, the Local Trusted Organisation [LTO] for Keighley.

The Keighley Big Local Partnership has made significant progress; laying good foundations for more ambitious project activity by developing partnerships to plan & deliver project activity, engaging with residents and those active in our area of interest and raising the profile of the Big Local programme.

The Keighley Big Local Partnership has established effective partnership working arrangements with key partners in the public, private and voluntary & community Sectors. This includes Bradford Metropolitan District Council, Keighley based businesses & social enterprise and numerous community and interest groups.

The Plan Review demonstrates the changes we are achieving as a direct result of project activity the Partnership has implemented and gives an indication of the extent of the change. Helping the Partnership to understand what is working and what isn't and providing a means for decision making that will inform future activity, delivery and spending.

The Plan Review will shape the second Keighley Big Local plan, covering the period 2018-2021 and is informed by consultation, questionnaires, online surveys and dedicated meetings & workshops.

About the Keighley Big Local Partnership

The Keighley Big Local Partnership agreed a Vision and Mission and a means of meeting them by adopting its governing document on 1/11/2015.

The Keighley Big Local Partnership is an unincorporated association with a Terms of Reference & Code of Conduct. The association may have a minimum of Eight members and Maximum of 20 'Big Local People': individuals who live, work or play in the Keighley Big Local area. 'Big Local People' have the right to vote. One member one vote and decisions can be made when One third of the voting members are present at a meeting. They are supported by a maximum of Seven 'Big Local Friends'; salaried workers from the Local Authority, Local Trusted Organisation and Council for Voluntary Services. Other organisations with an interest in meeting the Partnerships Vision can attend meetings to advise on particular subjects. Big Local Friends are present in an advisory capacity only, with no right to vote.

An effective and organised Partnership that can deliver activities [our objectives] which help meet the Vision & Mission will also help Keighley Big Local achieve the Four Local Trust Outcomes.

The Partnership meet 6 times every year. Only one meeting of the Partnership has not been quorate.

One of the largest challenges for the Keighley Big Local Partnership as a steering group is communication. The Partnership recognise the need to raise and maintain awareness of Big Local opportunity and maintain visibility of progress.

With consideration to capacity the Partnership illustrate projects and progress by focussing on Facebook, twitter, enewsletters and steady drip feeding of information to the local media. This is complemented with noticeboards placed in three community spaces within the Big Local area.

About the Keighley Big Local Area


The name we give to the area awarded the £1 Million in Keighley is 'Keighley Valley'.

Keighley Valley encompasses the neighbourhoods that exist along the River Worth and follow the main rail and road arteries through the Town of Keighley. The Keighley Valley name did not resonate with residents and partners and is therefore seldom used. We refer to our area of interest as the 'Keighley Big Local area' in all promotion. Keighley Big Local area, remains as defined.

One goal of the Partnership is to increase the community's knowledge of the opportunity and support offered by Big Local. We will continue to promote opportunity to the general public through Rapid Response activities, projects & media and encouraging 'ambassador' roles within the community. In addition to this, a communication policy will be developed to help shape our online presence and maintain a good profile throughout the area; using geographical segmentation as a strategy to 'market' Big Local more intensely in less active communities.

The Partnership will continue to utilise existing community space and encourage the diversification of other suitable space for Project activity.



CLOSER LOOK

Big Local People: Future Streets - Youth Work

Keighley Youth Service received a 12 month commission to develop, deliver and support youth work activity in a variety of settings. It delivers a range of youth work activities to support the social and personal development of young people aged 11-25. It also enables young people to play an active role to their communities through local decision making and volunteering.





About: Open access youth club Keighley Youth Service runs a weekly open access youth club at Keighley Young People's Centre (Parkwood) on Fridays, 6.15-8.45pm. Young people from across the Keighley Valley come together and take part in a range of recreational and issue-based activities. Young people have the opportunity to learn new skills and explore issues affecting their lives. Regular activities include cook and eat sessions, team games, pool and table tennis and issue-based workshops. Up to date Information, Advice and guidance, and one to one support can also be accessed at the centre.

"Youth club on a Friday night is good. We get to make more friends and build our confidence. It started off shy and didn't really talk to anyone. As time passed by I built up my confidence because of the youth workers. I have met different people from different cultures" (Anisha, 11)

Impact / Outcomes - Building Confidence

Partners

Anisha attends Friday youth club on a regular basis. At first she was reluctant to join in and was very shy, only coming into the building for short period of time. Over the last few months she has started to engage with workers and participate in some of the activities delivered in the youth club. She had also taken part in a range of outdoor activities at Doe Park and Fox Lane Challenge. Over a period of time, Anisha has grown in confidence, joining in cook and eat sessions alongside young people from different backgrounds. She is now beginning to get involved in planning activities.

What Impact have we had?



Big Local People: Future Streets - Youth Work

Keighley Youth Service received a 12 month commission to develop, deliver and support youth work activity in a variety of settings. It delivers a range of youth work activities to support the social and personal development of young people aged 11-25. It also enables young people to play an active role to their communities through local decision making and volunteering.

About: Detached Youth Work Keighley Youth Service runs a weekly detached youth work session on a Wednesday evening. Youth workers visit Big Local areas to promote and deliver a range of recreational and issue-based activities on the streets. They work alongside young people to identify and take appropriate action on issues affecting their lives. Young people can also access up to date 'Information Advice and Guidance' and find out about other local services. Detached work enables young people who would not feel confident in open access session to speak to workers and participate in youth work activities

"I like coming to youth club because I get to make new friends and do new things. Having a youth worker means there is always someone to talk to if you need them. I have learnt many life skills by taking part in activities" (Chloe, 17)

Impact / Outcomes - Building relationships

Chloe first came into contact with the youth service through talking to detached youth workers at Hainworth Wood. She now regularly attends both the street based detached session and the open access session at Parkwood. She enjoys cook and eat activities and taking part in group games. Chloe has grown in confidence during the time she has been involved in the project. She now enjoys helping to plan and deliver activities for other young people alongside youth workers at the open access youth club.

Big Local People: All for Play

A safe environment for play was the number one priority, according to community consultations for the Keighley Big Local area . The All for Play theme aims to increase play opportunities for people aged 1-101. In April 2017 the Keighley Big Local Partnership nominated Get Out More CIC to deliver outdoor play in the Keighley Big Local area. The 12 month commission provides 2 part time play workers delivering 10+ hours of outdoor play per week

Grace first came to our after school outdoor club at Parkwood Primary, but when she heard we also run holiday activities, was keen to discover more. Although shy at first, she soon comes out of her shell and joins in with activities and with other children. Her mum says that when she comes back she talks a lot about the leaders and the adventures they have had and loves telling people about her experiences in the woods.

What have we learned?

The results of consultation demonstrates we are doing what most people want us to do; that we should work to further our vision, aims and objectives. However, we recognise we need to focus efforts and build on what is working, we therefore propose to consolidate our objectives, reducing Seven themes to Five, highlighting the activities that are most important to the communities we serve.

We have included a lump sum in the new plan: an 'opportunity fund' that can be used to fund great ideas, emerging need and allow for a rapid response. Giving the plan more flexibility and opportunity for us to make the best use of other external resources, both human and financial.

We recognise the importance of sustaining Hainworth Wood Community Centre; the centre is integral to Keighley Big Local meeting Local Trust outcomes. The only community centre in our area is under threat. We will include support as a core activity rather opportunity through a grant process. Where appropriate we will negotiate with partners to design projects to be attractive to both Big Local and CLLD, creating a more ambitious holistic programme of work.

We feel the Partnership has grown in stature and able to develop and realise Legacy activity which will hopefully sustain Big Local way beyond the Local Trust funded period.

In December 2018, Bradford district is celebrating investment of almost £11 million in funding to stimulate the local economy to deliver jobs and growth. Two of the most deprived areas of the district have been awarded over £5.4 million in matched EU funding via the Leeds City Region European Structural Investment Fund to support activity that addresses local needs and opportunities over the next five years.

The funding will lead to Community Led Local Development (CLLD) programmes being set up in Keighley, including Keighley East Ward, of which a large proportion is a Big Local area. Community led local development is about local people getting involved to take the lead on activity that provides sustainable economic benefits. A key feature of the programme is the need for it to be community led. The Local Action Groups are responsible for the leadership, implementation, monitoring and review of these strategies and will make all major decisions affecting successful delivery, including decisions on the allocation of funding to projects.



What have we learned?

Through our experience of planning, delivering and reviewing the Big Local Plan, we know:

- We will continue to be known as the Keighley Big Local Partnership
- We will continue as an unincorporated association as our legal form
- We will continue to use the Terms of Reference as our governing document
- We will continue to be supported by Airedale Enterprise Service as our Local Trusted Organisation [LTO]; the LTO will continue to employ a Projects Coordinator.
- We will utilise our website to provide a project management tool i.e.. Online grant applications, community diary and greater information sharing
- The LTO will create a new part-time role to support the Partnership with the development of the Keighley Big Local Website.
- We will find new premises within the Big Local Area, as defined by the Local Trust within the first year of the Big Local Plan 2018-2021
- We will incorporate sub group meetings to complement our 6 regular Partnership meetings

The Keighley Big Local Plan for 2018-2021 will progress from the previous plan and we know:

- The Keighley Big Local Vision and Mission Statement will remain the same.
 - A Happy Keighley. A content Place: 'Big Local Keighley Valley will give people the power to create communities where everyone of all ages has the chance to live and play, where streets and open spaces are clean, safe and welcoming, with a supportive community which is strong and fair a community that learns and celebrates together'. 'A resident led community hub, Big Local Keighley Valley will be the organisation of choice for those people who want to make the area an even better place to live'
- We will submit a plan to Local Trust covering the period March 2018 to March 2021
- The Plan will be submitted in February 2018 in the hope of endorsement from Local Trust and a smooth continuation of plan activity from the end of the current period.
- The Plan will be more ambitious and combine aims and objectives with Community Led Local Development [CLLD] and other investment

- The current Themes will be consolidated to provide a more focused programme with the aim of furthering our purpose.
- We will communicate the plan and raise the profile of Keighley Big Local through social media, website and regular Street Talking meetings throughout Big Local area
- We will continue to produce a monthly newsletter and make it more relevant with the aim of increasing the mail list from 120 people to 275 [5% of the Keighley Big Local area population]

Play remains a priority for Keighley Big Local.

- We want to build on the success of the All for Play Team by keeping the Get Out More Outdoor Play Workers. We will explore increasing capacity of the team through CLLD funding.
- We will explore opportunity to create work experience and apprenticeships with Partners.
- We are unsure how to specifically support young people in the next plan. We will continue to develop relations with BMDC Youth Service and negotiate a means of support.



- We want to continue to provide grants for other organisations delivering play activities in the Keighley Big Local area. The grants should be larger to encourage more ambitious activities, with a particular emphasis on providing activity in the school holidays
- Residents found it confusing applying for grants under different fund categories so we will combine into one 'universal grants' pot.

Improvements to the street environment and green spaces within the Big Local area remains a priority for Keighley Big Local.

- We have merged Two popular themes together; Future Streets and A Great Outdoors. Keeping the name A Great Outdoors.
- We want to continue to improve the footpath networks throughout the Big Local area under the Walk & Sit Project.
- We want to work with BMDC Parks to improve the existing play areas in the Big Local area; Parkwood Street and Surrey Street. We will provide support to ensure the formal play areas are exciting, imaginative and fit for purpose, with an emphasis on sustaining interest through Friends of groups.

- We want to build on the successes to date of Hainworth Wood as a Community Woodland
- We want to encourage more community involvement in planning, designing and using outdoor space by providing grants which enhance the biodiversity of green spaces throughout the Big Local area with a particular emphasis on Park Wood, Hainworth Wood and the River Aire Corridor.

We recognise the need to help residents 'feel like a community'. You think this can be achieved by establishing a calendar of events, encouraging resident participation at every opportunity.

- We want to build on the success of the Children's Play Festival and continue to provide an annual event celebrating play.
- We want to build on the idea of Unique Keighley and continue to provide an annual event celebrating 'everything unique about Keighley', with an emphasis on celebrating industrial heritage and forging partnerships with business to give the event the best possible chance of continuing beyond Big Local funding.

- As opportunity for securing smaller grants diminish, we should provide a budget for smaller annual events: Keighley Big Local will offer a grant to partner organisations to help them establish events such as a Pancake Races [Centre for Young People], Winter Celebration [Friends of Park Wood], Duck Race [Friends of River Worth] and Conker competition [Hainworth Wood].
- We want to continue to provide a Free 'Golden Ticket' Halloween Party at Dragons Den.
- As well as provide financial resources, support from the Play team will be encouraged where appropriate.

We recognise the need for safe, welcoming community space throughout the Big Local area. Our priority is to ensure the Keighley Big Local area does not loose its only Community Centre at Hainworthwood. We would like to see other spaces developed to accommodate wider community activities.

A Community Space Grant will be made available to support communities to shape and maintain the buildings which matter most to them. This will be used to help groups manage community spaces and support them in organisational change to help continue or start to deliver activities in a way that might be more sustainable.

- Support will require applicants to submit a business plan supporting the proposals. We have learned that providing financial assistance does not always solve the problem in itself, encouraging a more holistic approach is needed for all scale of projects.
- We recognise not all communities have access to community space; meeting rooms and a place to build relations with neighbours and meet services. We want to build on the success of the HALE Community Bus to provide a mobile community venue throughout the Big Local area. This will involve developing a partnership with HALE.
- We want to build on the success of Street Surgeries. 'Street Talking' gives us the opportunity to meet with residents in their own community. To support this we will continue to award £50 [grot spot grants]; renamed Street Talking grants they will be used to deliver quick fixes for residents. I.e. Community Clean Ups, Community RePaint and access to Community transport
- The Rewards Project Budget will be carried over into the new plan. This is integral to developing both Play and Youth project projects.

We recognise the benefits of investing in leisure learning, training and supporting job creation.

- We have agreed to contribute £50,000 to a new partnership with UnLtd and Local Trust to accelerate social enterprise and increase local job creation over a three-year period.
- To complement the investment in social enterprise, we are thinking about providing business advice and a small grant to people living in the Big Local area to set up micro business such as domestic cleaning, window cleaners and gardeners. These could also be match funded by CLLD
- We want to keep providing the Learning Together grants for partner organisations to deliver leisure learning activities. These could also be match funded by CLLD

We recognise the Keighley Big Local Partnership should be supported in delivering the plan.

• We want Airedale Enterprise Service to continue to employ a Projects Coordinator to help the Partnership deliver the Keighley Big Local Plan. The Projects Officer Role should be increased to 4 days per week [0.8FTE]. This does not have to be a single worker.

- We want to make more use of the Keighley Big Local website. The Projects Coordinator will be supported with a new role- a 0.2 FTE post to manage the Keighley Big Local website: to create a community calendar, online grant applications and host digital social and history projects.
- We want to keep the budget for rents/ rates of an office space within the Keighley Big Local area.
- We want to keep the Partnership Members training budget
- The Partnership require a house-keeping budget to cover sundries including volunteer expenses and room hire.

How have we progressed our Vision and Priorities?

The first Keighley Big Local Plan is constructed around Seven Themes. These themes and the activities within them provide a means for the Keighley Big Local Partnership to meet its Vision & Mission for Keighley Big Local:

Vision 'A Happy Keighley. A Content Place'

Mission 'Big Local Keighley Valley will give people

the power to create communities where everyone of all ages has the chance to live and play, where streets and open spaces are clean, safe and welcoming, with a supportive

community which is strong and fair

A community that learns and celebrates together'. A resident led community hub, Big Local Keighley will be the organisation of choice for those people who want to make the area an even better place to live'

The Vision, Mission, Themes & the activities within [our objectives] articulate the needs, wants and aspirations identified through consultation with residents during the Big Local Pathway in 2015. The hugely successful consultation was the catalyst in ensuring a people-centric plan.

The first 2 years of Keighley Big Local 2016-2018 was very much about testing the water; planning and delivering micro scale projects which would raise the profile of Big Local and tap into peoples interests, building enthusiasm and motivation to deliver a more ambitious programme.

We feel all the activity we have promoted has helped to achieve our vision and aims [priorities]. Our communities are in a stronger position to identify local needs and take positive action in response to them. Individuals and groups are becoming more informed with increased skills and confidence so that they can continue to identify and respond to needs more effectively in the future. This is demonstrated in our consultation.

As a Partnership we have dealt effectively in a changing economic & social climate with partners, suppliers & contractors in meeting our objectives. 
A Happy Keighley. A content Place:

Do we need to refresh our vision and priorities?

No. At a quorate meeting of the Full Partnership held on 18/10/2017 it was unanimously agreed to further the purpose of the Keighley Big Local Partnership as set out in the Terms of Reference [Governing Document] and the Keighley Big Local Plan 2016-2018.

We feel that our vision and aims [priorities] are still current. However, the review process has highlighted our successes, less successful activity, perceptions and capacity and with this information we have re-designed our objectives [activities] to focus activity to achieve a greater impact.



How does our progress relate to the achievement of the Big Local outcomes?

We feel that the activities delivered and the progress we have made is contributing to the Big Local outcomes.

This is best demonstrated by Partnership supported and resident led projects such as:

- Formation of the Friends of the River Worth
- Café Eden Support group for families with children on the autism spectrum
- STAR Youth Project
- Jam On Top Music Project for Young People
- Walk & Sit Project with Private and Public Sector Partners
- All for Play Tender, providing outdoor play and training for all ages
- Youth Work Tender, providing support for children and young people
- Flag ship "The Rec" Play area and emerging Friends of.
- Emerging 'Little Big Local' which aims to involve more children and young people in decision making

Our communities are being enabled and supported; empowered to make decisions about the things they care about the most and helping to make Keighley an even better place to live and work in.

What next? Do we need a new or revised plan, or will we carry on with our existing plan?

The Keighley Big Local Partnership has agreed to submit a new plan.

The current plan covers a 2 year period from April 2016-February 2018. The Partnership has agreed to produce a plan for the period 2018-2021. Extending the plan period to 3 year will allow us to provide a more ambitious programme and accommodate fully our partnership with Unitd.

How do we know this is what our community wants?

The Partnership prides itself on giving our communities greater opportunity to influence Keighley Big Local. We do this through participative, direct democracy as well as consultation exercises. We use our rapid response grants [of up to £50] to provide an attempt at an instant quick fix, giving people confidence in their capacity to control their own circumstances.

By keeping consultation simple, using simple language and mixing engagement with fun activities and leisure learning experiences we feel like we are getting the true views and opinions of the communities we are here to serve. Here are a couple of examples.

- Keighley Big Local organised a Willy Wonka style Golden Ticket event in partnership with Parkwood Primary School. 50 high achieving Pupils received an exclusive ticket for a Halloween party at Dragons Den Soft Play. A further 50 tickets were distributed to 'good neighbours' by Partnership members. All families were encouraged to complete a questionnaire. 84 questionnaires were returned.
- Keighley Big Local Partnership organised the 3rd Parkwood Children's Play Festival on 1st August 2017. 120 residents enjoyed an afternoon of traditional play, exercise and giant inflatables. Those attending were encouraged to complete a questionnaire in return for a free ice cream. 49 questionnaires were returned.


